 September, 2017. And follow up thereafter.
 - Periodically meetings were held with department heads, teaching, non-teaching staff and students

 meetings were held with external IQAC members and recommendations were implemented.
 Team of IQAC members conducted two rounds of visit of various college facilities to ascertain
 preparations.

 - Several experts from the academic field were invited to provide expert inputs and help preparation. Three rounds of mock presentations were conducted for departmental, committees and other facilities. They were evaluated by principals of other colleges and ex-vice chancellors
 - Exam audit was conducted by external experts.
 - Management carried out deep cleaning of the departments and other facilities
- Post NAAC visit follow up and working towards college autonomy: Prof. Kurup held a session to appraise newly constituted IQAC committee about new NAAC guidelines and designing a road map for next seven year cycle and autonomy.
- Automation was introduced in college Administration, Admission process and Attendance records. 'Wilson App' was introduced for better connectivity and dissemination of information.
- Wi-fi facility was installed in the institution
- Principal's Task Force came into operation. It is a body of students helping functioning of college. A learn and earn opportunity for students.
- A new initiative-Principal –Student Open Forum was started to have a face to face discussion with students
- A properly equipped Medical Aid Room with an experienced in-house nurse was opened to provide emergency medical aid. Through this centre free medical check up, Hapititis 'B' vaccination drive and a free eye check up, in collaboration with NSS and Andrew's Vision Centre, was organised.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum for Courses is decided by Board of Studies at the University level. Many teachers from the college are members of Board of studies and syllabus committees. The college takes feedback from various stakeholders on the curriculum and the same is conveyed to the respective Board of Studies/ Syllabus committees by these members so that the final syllabus meets the academic requirements of the students admitted to our college. Since the college conducts various certificate courses the curriculum for the same is developed in –house keeping in mind the target group for the course.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Teaching learning is an important process of academic institution.
- Academic time table is drawn in the beginning of the year and is strictly adhered to
- College recruits well qualified teachers
- Induction and orientation programme is conducted for newly appointed teachers and first year students
- Book-bank facility is provided for the needy students,
- AVC provides academic support to the visually challenged,
- Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners
- Departments conduct Bridge lectures
- College library and department libraries are regularly updated
- Departments regularly organise visits, excursions, guest lectures
- There are academic activities for advanced learners
- A multidisciplinary approach to learning is ensured by holding sessions on map reading activity at the beginning of the academic year for all final year students.
- Research projects by learners are undertaken mainly by science departments.
- Institution organises certificate and diploma courses for different disciplines in collaboration with outside renowned institutions wherein outside speakers are invited. Some of the courses include activities like trails and camps which make learning interactive and collaborative.
- Class room debates, regular exposure to different perspectives and critiques are some efforts to harness critical thinking.
- Many science departments are PG and Ph. D. centres. Hence, research is a part of academic attitude of the institution.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The exam pattern is decided by the university. The college has improved facilities for conduct of exams viz. – self contained exam room, additional staff, enhanced infrastructure - for storage ,printing and processing of results, outsourcing of result preparation functions. Facilities for visually challenged and students with learning disabilities while writing exams (in the form of arrangement of writers, giving extra time and providing separate classrooms) are provided. The college tries to ensure that the exam process is smooth and trouble free for the students.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Research Committee worked towards encouragement of research in the college. Some teachers/students were provided with seed money to start project in certain areas. Workshops on writing and submitting research projects were held. Teachers are encouraged to avail FIP facility. As there are PhD centres in college, teachers register with the department. Rainbow- It is a unique forum for students from seven north eastern states to encourage retain their cultural uniqueness and through this forum they get their identity and opportunity to participate in the main stream activities of the college. Wilson College is a popular choice among these students for the past many years and generations.
- 4. Andrew's Vision Centre Caters to the academic and other needs of the visually challenged students not only of Wilson College but also from outside. The centre provides technological assistance and volunteers as readers and writers for the students. Apart from academics, co-curricular and extracurricular activities are organised.

5. Multidisciplinary approach to syllabus: interdepartmental collaborations in academics and cocurricular activities enhance understanding of diversity and encourage spirit of inclusivity and academic tolerance which is an important foundation of holistic education.

Evidence of Success: Wilson College boasts of having students from all sections of society. Hostels regularly houses students from different states especially from states of north east.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: No particular problem is faced in this aspect as it has been given a long legacy of the college. Many generations have studied in this institution.

2. Developing Contemporary Sensibilities and Professional Expertise:

Goal – In addition to imparting formal education through formal academic process of teaching learning, institution strives to go beyond the constraints of formal education demarcated by the syllabi of the discipline. The main objective is to provide holistic education that forester all around development of the students.

Context – College being affiliated to the University of Mumbai has to function within its academic and structural confines. This sometimes can limit growth of students or may not cater to the needs of all.

The Practice – 1. Certificate courses – College conducts many certificate courses that have different perspectives and objectives like skill development, enhancing critical thinking, promoting varied academic and non-academic interests, sensitizing students about disabilities. Course contents are designed to supplement as well as go beyond existing syllabi. They are conducted in collaboration with many renowned institutions. Resource persons from other institutions are invited which broadens the intellectual horizons of participants.

2. Skill Development Courses – Co-operative education programme is being organised uninterrupted since 1979 with an aim to develop employability of students. This six- week program with three distinctive phases is designed, mainly, to bridge the gap between academics and the field of work with an objective to expose students to various career options and work culture. The program is open to students of second year B.Sc. and B.A. Their selection is done after a scrutiny by way of interview. The first is the camp phase lasting for about a week. During the camp, self awareness, personality development, team building, leadership exercises and other interactive sessions are arranged to enable students to get an insight into their potential, strengths and weaknesses. An outstation camp offers informal and rejuvenating atmosphere to the students. The second phase is of workshops and lectures. Here, speakers, consultants and professionals from various fields engage day-long interactive sessions to provide career guidance and share their experiences with the students. This phase is very intensive and rigorous, in which students undergo the process of self-actualization. The third phase is of internship/placement or field work. The students are attached to firms or corporate offices or research labs/ research institutes

according their chosen option. Employability Skills Enhancement Programme (ESEP) was started in 2013 to serve a similar purpose. Initially it was catering to the residents of St. Andrew's Hostel but later it was extended to other learners as well. They organize subject specific career guidance lectures and skill development workshops for their learners and offer internships to their learners and also help in providing placements to their graduating learners.

- 3. Multidisciplinary approach: Interdisciplinary seminars and symposia are regularly organised sessions like map reading are organised for all students. Interdepartmental initiatives like Biomosaic, certificate course in Quantitative Analysis for Social Sciences (Department of Economics and Physics). Interdepartmental research encourages staff and students to have multidisciplinary perspective to learning.
- 4. Nature Club It is forum not just to sensitize students about environment but also about range of learning about culture, heritage and more these learning's truly translate into preparing students with global competencies and professional expertise.

Evidence of Success: Students build confidence and are equipped to work in all kinds of work culture and have become successful professionals.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Infrastructural inadequacies and financial constraints and limited industry interaction can limit efforts of the college in providing greater value addition to students.
